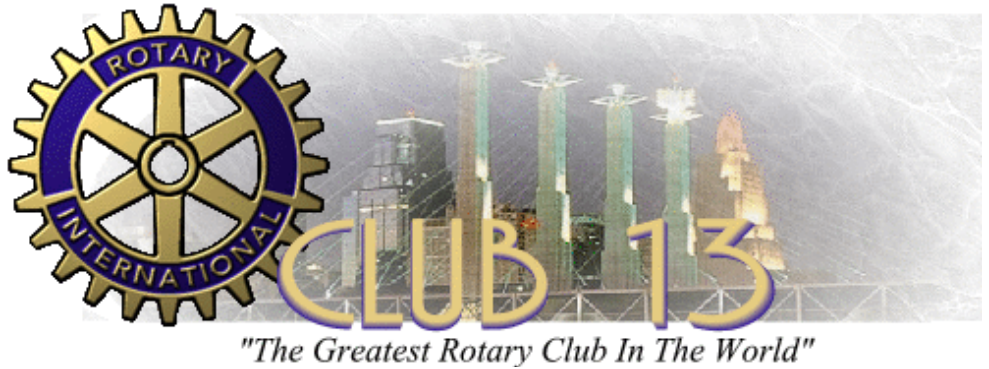

Robert Goodwin, President, Points of Light Foundation



After joining the Points of Light Foundation in 1992 as executive vice president and chief operating officer, Robert K. Goodwin was named president and CEO in 1995. Together with the Volunteer Center National Network, the foundation engages millions of people more effectively in volunteer service to help solve serious social problems.

Goodwin was instrumental in development of the 1997 President's Summit for America's Future, which celebrated a commitment to improve the quality of life for the nation's youth.

Prior to joining the Points of Light Foundation, Goodwin was executive director of the U.S. Department of Education's White House Initiative on Historically Black Colleges and Universities. He has also served as assistant deputy chancellor for external affairs at Texas A&M University and director of public information and associate vice president for university relations at Prairie View A&M University.

President **Rick**, wielding the gavel in his normal expert and expeditious manner, introduced **Tom Dunn** who, accompanied by **Carl** . . . wait a minute! Hold the presses! Let's get it right this time. How many times have we said, e.g. "**Harlan Stamper** (who, we might add, played hooky from today's meeting thus causing poor Brother **Dunn** to be drafted out of the choir to lead us in singing) accompanied by **Carl Bolte** on the piano, led us in singing"? We say this issue after issue although we all know that it is the pianist who is the straw that stirs the Club 13 musical drink. It is the pianist who sets the meter and keeps us reasonably on key. It is the magician of the keyboard whose play inspires us to song. The conductor is there merely to frown at off-key members who do not have the ear to realize it. So, . . . as we were intending to say . . . Virtuoso Pianist Extraordinaire **Carl E. Bolte, Jr.** got the meeting off to a fantastic start with an incredibly beautiful version of "America the Beautiful" on the piano as the club, led by **Tom Dunn**, hummed along in wondrous awe.

**David Fromm** delivered the invocation, the meal prayer from the Philmont Boy Scout Ranch. **Chris Watkins** introduced the day's guests. President **Rick** reported that **Jane Axon** and **Leon Triggs** continue to recuperate at home. **Rick** also encouraged members to participate with \$100 per year contributions to the Rotary Foundation to fund Rotary International's campaign to eradicate polio from the earth by 2005. Another pre-program highlight of the meeting was **Rick Crouch's** presentation to President **Rick** of the traveling bowling trophy signifying Club 13's recent victory over the St. Louis club at Columbia.

**Tom Terry** introduced our speaker, **David Eaton**, from Monterrey, Mexico. Mr. Eaton, who was in town to participate in the North American International Trade Corridor Partnership Summit 2004, is a business consultant and also the President of the Monterrey Rotary Club.

The announced topic of Eaton's address was "The Importance of Mexico to the National Security of the United States." He began by referencing a quote from President Bush, in an address of Sept. 6, 2001, that Mexico would be the most important country to the United States in the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Eaton identified a number of discrete areas which accounted for the importance, among them being energy, economic security, border security, environmental concerns, and demographics (the interconnectivity of the two societies which, although geographically close, are culturally distinct).

Eaton reported that within the last year Mexico had "quietly overtaken Saudi Arabia" as the largest foreign supplier of petroleum to the United States. Mexico is also one of the United States' larger suppliers of natural gas and has a number of power-generating plants south of the border which sell electricity to the fastest-growing areas in the United States in southern California, Arizona and Texas.

The border between Mexico and the United States, approximately 2,000 miles in total, is the most-crossed border in the world, over 300 million legal crossings per year. The crossings are of both people and goods, as component parts manufactured in Mexico but necessary for assembly and integration into finished products in the United States cross the border every hour. Mexico's export market is now the fastest growing export market in the world. This factors into what Eaton referred to as one of Mexico's bigger success stories in the last couple of years: its developing middle class. The great disparity of rich vs. poor in Mexico still exists,

but the gap is closing as a larger and stronger middle class emerges.

Eaton closed by saying that Rotary clubs in Mexico play important leadership roles in improvement of Mexico's democracy, elections and corporate ethics and government. Fielding some excellent questions from the floor, he replied that Mexico is not a member of OPEC and that it is now producing 100% of its petroleum capacity. However, the government-owned petroleum monopoly suffers from lack of capital and is lagging behind in supply exploration and development of new infrastructure. The Mexican constitution prohibits any private investment into the petroleum monopoly. Although privatization has come to some parts of Mexico's economy, he does not foresee it happening any time soon in the petroleum segment.

President **Rick** thanked Eaton for his highly informative talk, advising that a contribution would be made to the Rotary Youth Camp in his name.

## Proposed Constitution and By-Laws Revisions

The Board of Directors has approved and is recommending adoption of proposed revisions to our Constitution and By-Laws. These proposed revisions were drafted by our Constitution - Legal Affairs Committee with extensive input from our current and past officers, directors and division leaders. They are scheduled to be voted upon by our membership at our regular luncheon meeting at noon on Thursday, June 17, 2004.

Copies of the proposed revisions are being sent by e-mail to all members who receive e-mail. For those who do not, copies will be available at our regular luncheon meetings, beginning on Thursday, June 3, 2004.

Many of the proposed revisions were made to reflect changes in our operation since our Constitution and By-Laws were last updated. These changes include the discontinuation of committees, the creation of new committees and divisions, and the process by which we select International Convention delegates. The proposed revisions also reflect changes in the By-laws of Rotary International eliminating territorial limits on clubs in favor of a locality rule which allows a new club to be organized in the same locality as one or more existing clubs.

Under the proposed revisions, our Nominating Committee is to remain unchanged, with five members voted upon by ballot from ten candidates selected by the Board, plus the five most recent past presidents. The Nominating Committee's slate is to include one candidate for president-elect, one candidate for secretary-treasurer, and six candidates for the three open board positions. Any five members in good standing may nominate additional candidates, provided they have the written consent of each additional candidate. The votes will be counted and the results announced at the annual election meeting.

With regard to fees and dues, the proposed revisions eliminate references to specific dollar amounts. The admission fee, annual dues and Rotary Foundation contribution of each kind of membership are to be determined annually by the Board. The Board may grant an exception to dues payment by any member conditioned by any terms and limitations deemed necessary and appropriate.

Our club Constitution cannot be changed except to conform it more closely to the standard club Constitution imposed by Rotary International on clubs chartered after our club. Our Constitution contains many variations from the standard club Constitution which we do not want to change. The proposed revisions to our club Constitution deal only with the locality of the club, termination for non-payment of dues, board discretion to cancel up to four regular meetings each year, and the definition of the term "mailed." Under the proposed revisions, termination for non-payment of dues would be subject to the discretion of the Board instead of our present requirement that membership automatically terminate if dues are not paid on or before ten (10) days from the date of notification of any past due account. All of the proposed revisions to our club Constitution comply with the requirement that they conform our language more closely to that of the standard club Constitution.

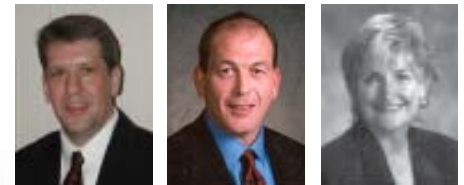
