Marcia Fennesey introduced our speaker, Bruce Bradley, librarian for special collections at the Linda Hall Library.

The library was established in the early 1940's by bequest of the estate of Herbert F. Hall and his wife Linda Hall. The Hall Trust is still the primary funding source for the library, which has an annual operating budget around \$7 million.

The collection ranges from rare books like *Narratio Prima*, published in 1540, describing Copernicus' theories, to the more than 13,500 technical journals subscribed to annually.

If you need information on Galileo, Newton, Darwin or engineering, or patents or trademarks or government specifications or even welding, the Linda Hall Library is your source. Bradley told us that each year the library staff fields more than 42,000 reference inquiries from more than 70 countries.

Even if you're not into rare books or technical topics, visit the 14-acre arboretum surrounding the library.

As he reminded us, "The Linda Hall Library is yours for the using, so use it." The library is located at 51st and Cherry. Web surfers should surf over to www.lindahall.org.

Camp Enterprise 2004

The 27th annual Camp Enterprise was held Sept. 18-19 at the Rotary Youth Camp.

The camp was very successful and had a very positive impact on the lives of

the 55 students who were able to attend. Although 82 students had registered to come to the camp, the heavy rainstorms on Saturday morning seemingly discouraged some of the campers from attending. However, the smaller number of students didn't affect the quality of our program and the experience the students received was outstanding.

Camp Enterprise took a year off in 2003 while the organizers regrouped and decided on changes in the structure of the camp. Two primary changes were made this year: the camp was reduced to two days from two and a half days; and high school juniors were invited instead of seniors. I truly believe these changes were very positive.

Another positive change was the way we recruited the students. We partnered with the Alliance of Community Educators to contact the schools and handle the full recruiting process. ACE Development Manager Lori Hewitt did an excellent job of contacting the students and following up with the schools.

Months before the big weekend, a team of Rotarians began the planning process. Assisting with operations was **Dick Harmes**, and **Alan Corbet** was program chair, recruiting the speakers. **Elliott Goldstein** recruited discussion leaders and **Christy Chester** was food chair. **Scott Holsman** was in charge of fund raising and volunteers. Helping us whenever we had a question or a problem were our mentors, President **Sally Bibb** and **Marc Horner**.

As stated above, camp started out a little damp, but our spirits weren't dampened as we arrived early Saturday morning to begin the setup. Volunteers recruited by **Scott Holsman** helped with

setup and meals during the two days.

The buses arrived at 9:00 a.m. and the students were glad the rain had let up some. Each student received his or her cabin and group assignment and a wonderful t-shirt designed by **Chuck Vogt, Jr.'s** artists at All Star Awards. This year's theme was "Investing in You." After unloading their equipment, all headed for the multipurpose building so they could begin their adventure.

Sally Bibb and I gave welcoming comments. The opening speaker was former Rotarian Jack Mackey. His presentation, "Love the Battle," and an icebreaker game helped the students get to know each other.

Next, **Dan Jensen** with Career Management Associates led the students in team building and a group problem solving exercise. They learned critical points that would be incorporated into the business simulation later that day.

This year was the 21st time **John Carey** has led the students through the Junior Achievement business simulation, the cornerstone of Camp Enterprise. Although the students looked a little dazed early Saturday morning as **John** explained what they would be doing, they were soon enthusiastically participating in the exercise. The students were divided into 12 groups, each with a discussion leader. The discussion leaders were Ed Buckley, **Christy Chester**, **Elliott Goldstein**, **Dick Harmes**, **Scott Holsman**, Jason Holsman, Becky Oliver, **George Heymach**, Dave Huston, Matt Young, **Kamran Jahanshahi**, Vanessa Sisk and **Scott Wagner**.

One of the students summarized the experience in an evaluation comment: "This is the best camp I've ever visited. The business part was excellent because of the combination of theory and practical parts."

By mid-afternoon the students were ready for a well-deserved break. While some practiced for the talent show, others played basketball and volleyball, swam or just hung out, getting to know each other. One industrious student wrote an article for the Camp Street Journal.

Papa John's provided pizza for Saturday evening dinner. After dinner Ed

Honesty, president and CEO of Best Harvest Bakeries, spoke to the students on the topic, "Believe in Your Dreams." Honesty told of the choices he made that brought him out of the South Side of Chicago to attend Yale and receive his law degree from Northwestern University. After many years as in-house attorney for McDonald's, Honesty decided to go into business for himself and bought a bakery that makes all the buns for McDonald's in the Midwest. The company also makes buns for the Department of Defense and the Kansas Speedway. Honesty challenged the students to reach inside themselves and go with what is in their hearts when planning their futures.

After dinner it was back to work, running the 12 businesses that had been created that morning. It seemed like the students were really pumped up for that evening's challenges. At the end of the evening's session, **John Carey** gave his most important lesson of the day: how to make a S'more. With Jason Holsman's group acting as a campfire, **John** showed our two AFS students, Carol Servian and Sasha Bahochova, how to roast the marshmallows over the fire and then layer them between two graham crackers and Hershey's bar. He then showed them how to stuff the whole thing in their mouths at once so they didn't get any marshmallow on their faces. For a while we thought we were going to have to perform the Heimlich maneuver on **John**, but he pulled through.

The rest of the evening was filled with making and eating S'mores (using a real campfire) and dancing to the music of the DJ Party All the Time. While the students enjoyed themselves, **David McCaughey** worked on the Camp Street Journal. The newsletter included pictures taken by **Dave Bryan** and an article written by camper Joshua Sneed from Spring Hill High School.

Lights were out at 11:30 and after the full day, it wasn't hard to get the students to turn in. Each of the cabins was well guarded by an adult. Those brave souls who slept in the cabins were **James Daley**, Dave Huston, **George Heymach**, Matt Young, Ed Nickel, **Christy Chester**, Liz Giffin (daughter of Don), Sara Scott (daughter of Diane)

and her friend Kari Keeny, and Michelle Brownlee.

Sunday morning began with an entertaining breakfast from Chris Cakes. Let me tell you, it is hard to catch a pancake on a paper plate that early in the morning. After breakfast, a Catholic mass was performed by Father Luke Byrne and ecumenical services were led by **Dan Doty**.

After the services the students were exposed to three more examples of successful businesspersons through the "Common Threads of Success." **Alan Corbet** recruited Keith Molzer of VeriCash Systems, LLC, Paul Weber of Entrepreneur Advertising Group, and **Tom Tatro** of INvironments, LLC, to share their entrepreneur experiences with the students.

After lunch it was back to work in the final rounds of the business simulation. It was impressive to see the change in the decision-making capabilities of the companies from the previous day. At this time, the campers were given the opportunity to write a short essay on who they considered the most interesting business person. **Dave Bryan** donated Sittings for Senior Photos as prizes for the contest. Kaitlynn Shipley from Fort Osage High School won first prize with her essay on Warren Buffet; Melissa VanderWal from RayPec won second with her essay on her boss, Ryan Antonodies; and Kaitlin Kilgore from North Kansas City took third with an essay on her uncle, Tony Konomos.

Then the campers enjoyed some much-deserved free time. Dinner was a cookout of hamburgers and hotdogs and all the fixings.

Tony DiPardo, Mr. Music, hosted the talent show, with his band, led by Carroll Lewis, providing the music for the performers. There was no shortage of talent among the students. Emcees for the show were Jordan Hobson of Sumner and Jennifer Ray of Spring Hill. The first-place winner was JaNae Contag from Blue Valley North; second place was won by Noah Buboltz from Blue Springs; third place went to Brittany Dias from Lee's Summit North; and fourth place was captured by Luke Godwin from Grandview High School.

Not only did **Tony** host the talent

show, he provided cash prizes for the first- through third- place winners. The fourth-place winner was awarded a football signed by Casey Wiegmann of the KC Chiefs and donated by Matt Young. **Tony** also donated an autographed Chiefs football, which was won by Jessica Chavez from Bishop LeBlond.

After the talent show the students packed up their belongings and gathered for the final event of the weekend. Adrienne Edmondson of Edmondson & Associates, Inc. gave a dynamic presentation on "The Four Ds of Entrepreneurship". She spoke about Determination, Desire, Decision Making and Dreams. She really rallied the crowd as she told of how she lost her job at Aquila and went on to start her own business.

Finally it was time to load up the buses and wave goodbye. It wasn't hard to tell that a lot of new friendships were developed that weekend, and not just for the Campers. We Rotarians also got to know each other better and became friends. We are already talking about next year's camp. 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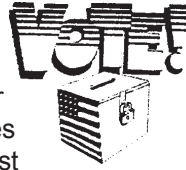


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These Are Your Candidates in the Upcoming Rotary Club 13 Election!
